




#### Your rights and responsibilities

- The law gives you the right to express a preference for the school you would most like your child to attend and to give reasons for that preference.
- As a parent you do have a right to express a preference for up to five schools.
- You are encouraged to use all five preferences.






### Applying






### Supporting Evidence Forms

- Some schools need a separate form filling in too see pack of <u>supporting evidence forms</u> - this is for Foundation or Voluntary Aided Schools in Wolverhampton

- The King's Church of England School

- Forms can be downloaded from the School Admissions website.
- and also from other boroughs. E.g Walsall you will need to get these from the relevant Education Service.
- · These have to be sent back to the relevant school
- They are used by the governors of these schools to decide children they can offer places to.

- Every effort will be made to meet parents' wishes. However if it is not possible to allocate a place at any of your preferred schools your child will be allocated a place at the nearest community school that has a place available.
- This may be some distance away!





# How are applications prioritised if a school is over-subscribed? (Community Schools)

- 1. Looked After Children (in care of local authority)
- · 2. Medical/social
- 3. Siblings (brothers/sisters etc)
- · 4. Distance
- (check with individual school e.g. Moseley, St Peters, Girls High, St Edmunds etc in book as some vary especially Faith Schools)


#### Home address


- The permanent residence of a pupil when the place is offered
- · Owned by parent/guardians
- Leased or rented by parents / guardians
- Beware they do check up!



#### Late submissions


- Applications received after the cut off date (31<sup>st</sup> October 2018) will be treated as late.
- Applying after this date will jeopardise your chances of gaining a place in your preferred school.






## What if I do not get the school of my choice?

- You will be notified of your child's school place allocation on National Allocation Day - 1<sup>st</sup> March 2019
- You can see this through the online application system and you will also receive an email containing your child's allocation details
- Appeal you will be told how to appeal. (Quite formal)






#### Y6 SATS

- We are now working to new expectations of Y6
- The expectations are <u>higher</u>.

#### Children will do

- An Arithmetic test and two Maths tests
- A Reading Test (in three sections)
- A SPAG Test (spelling, punctuation and grammar)
- Writing is assessed by teachers in school (moderated with other schools)




- · Children will be given a score to see if they meet national expectations.
- These scores will be passed onto secondary schools.
- The tests will take place in the week beginning 13<sup>th</sup> May 2019.
- We continue to gather evidence of writing in the children's books until the end of June.


## How we will support your child

- Two highly-skilled qualified teachers in Y6 every morning
- Extra one to one or small group support from other staff.
- Small group phonics and spelling
- Regular assessments to find out exactly what your child can and cannot do so that we can focus on improving
   the areas they need to work on.

- Detailed parent consultations to look at how we can work together to support your child. (Oct 2018)
- SATs Revision books in line with new expectations
- Extra tuition sessions on Mondays afterschool (no charge to parents). We will let you know when this will start.



- How can you support your child?
- Make sure they come to school every day and on time.
- Ensure that they read regularly and ask them lots of questions about what they have read - as it is the understanding of reading that is now important. (The reading paper has been the one that children have found the most challenging in the last two years.)
- Ensure they do their homework
- Attend parent consultations so that you know exactly what they need to do to improve.



- Ensure that children attend "extra tuition sessions" as this costs school a lot of money to provide and staff work hard to prepare these lessons.
- Encourage your child to always do their best and to accept and act upon the advice they are given by staff. Take responsibility for their own learning.
- Ask for help when it is needed. (Parents and children) and keep on trying -even when it is difficult.
